- Administrative work is done largely through the use of computers.
- The college has 5(five) ICT enabled class rooms and one (1) Virtual class room to facilitate ICT enabled teaching.

- 7.2 Provide the Action Taken Report (ATR) based on the plan of action decided upon at the beginning of the year:

Curricular Aspects:

• A cultural group comprising of students of different departments has been formed under the leadership of Dr. Mili Dutta Pal, Assistant Professor of Philosophy. This group has staged group songs, group dance and mime show in different cultural programmes organised by the college or by the Students Union of the college. In the Exit Meeting of the NAAC Peer team on 7th December, 2016, the students of this cultural group had performed very well laying bare the multicultural values nurtured by this college. On 21st February 2017 this cultural group had performed at Kolkata in a programme organised by 'Bhasa Chetana Samity' to celebrate International Language Day.

The IQAC had suggested to involve the students of different departments in making teaching aids under the guidance of the teacher. Students of every departments had made a number of teaching aid with zeal and enthusiasm. These teaching aids have been displayed in an exhibition organised by IQAC.

• The college had applied for four new science subjects namely Botany, Zoology, Chemistry and Geography seeking extension of affiliation from the West Bengal State Council of Higher Education, Govt. Of West Bengal and West Bengal State University. Both the Council and the affiliating University have granted extension of affiliation for these four subjects to be introduce as general course from the session 2017-18.

Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

- i) All honours departments had organised class room seminars during the last session. Students were encouraged to present their papers by using LCD projector in front of the Principal, departmental teachers and teachers from the other departments. Some of the Students of Arabic and Sanskrit Departments presented their lecture in these Languages.
- ii) After completing the syllabus usually special classes / tutorial classes are taken by the teachers. Specially after completion of the selection test, every departments have taken tutorial classes whenever necessary.

Research, Consultancy and extension

i) The issue of introduction of reward system for the departments for encouraging the teachers to pursue Minor or Major Research Project and other research works has been discussed in the IQAC meeting but this has not yet been implemented at the formal level.

Infrastructure and learning resources

- It was decided to repair and renovate the floors of the old building of the college, especially, the floor of the office -1, Office- II and the corridor of the ground floor. The repair and renovation work has been fully completed. The cement floor of the old building has been replaced by floor tiles.

The workshop on 'COMMUNITY ENRICHMENT THROUGH RURAL EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS: PROSPECTS AND PROBLEMS' was held on 25th March, 2017 from 11.30 am in the seminar hall of the college. The intention of the workshop was to investigate into the various methods in which rural educational institutions could maximize their social responsibility. The workshop hosted resource persons from various fields in this area with firsthand knowledge and had as its target audience in the teachers, non-teaching staff and students of the college.

The workshop began with the inaugural session consisting of the concept note read out by Dr. Saurabh Bhattacharyya, assistant professor in English of the college. In the concept note Dr. Bhattacharyya summarized the intention of the organizers behind the holding of the workshop. He also reiterated on the fact that this workshop would herald many similar future activities involving a greater number of stakeholders. The Teacher-in Charge of the college welcomed all resource persons and participants and wished it a complete success.



The Technical Session I began at around 12 noon. The

resource person in this session was Swami Kamalasthananda, Principal, Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Centenary College, and Rahra. With the help of a power point presentation, the speaker elucidated on various technical and theoretical aspects of dissemination of education in rural institutions. In the extremely animating question and answer session which followed his one hour long address, the speaker provided numerous instances from his own experiences of heading a residential college to drive his point home. The session was followed a lunch break.

The next session, Technical Session II started at about 2 pm.The resource person, Dr. Manasendu Kundu, Summer Faculty, Department of Anthropology and Environment Studies, University of California, Santa Barbara and Guest Faculty, Department of Humanities and Social Sciences, Indian Institute of Engineering Science and Technology, Shibpur spoke on his own experiences of teaching abroad and applied the parameters of such international modes of teaching to the rural educational institution. At the end of the lecture a documentary film entitled 'ICHCHHE', directed by the engineering students of IIEST, Shibpur, and dealing with informal schooling of street children was screened. The question -answer session at the end of his lecture, aided by ICT enabled means, was also extremely interesting.

The workshop ended with a vote of thanks and a valedictory address presented by Professor Rupa Chakraborty of the department of History.

A mechanism of quantification based on the analysis of student feedback is adopted, using parameters related to a variety of items like the Course, Library, Support service and the Teachers in particular. In quest of some sort of objectivity, only the outgoing 3rdyear students of each Department are called upon to respond to the questionnaire.

Analysis of the Course and the Departments:

The 4-to-8-item questionnaire relates to the Course, Library, Support Service and the Teachers. Each question has 4 options - 1, 2, 3, and 4. The questionnaire involves a multiplicity of items and issues like learning value of the course, its depth and applicability, the infrastructure of a department and its academic ambience. The method quantification employed has a number of steps undertaken serially.

- Step 1: Calculating the percentage of grade-response to each question asked about the course of a department.
- Step 2: The pooled average is calculated in terms of percentage, as in Step 1, thus determining an overall percentage of responses to each grade for a specific parameter. This gives us a sense of the combined proportion of 4 for Very Good/Strongly Agree, 3 for Good/Agree, 2 for satisfactory/neither agree nor disagree and 1 for unsatisfactory/disagree for each of the parameters (items).
- Step-3: Pie chart/Bar Diagrams/3D Pyramid chart are prepared for all the questionnaires on the basis Students' response.

Overall ratings of Students feedback have been formulated as (\sum of ratings/number of total qustions) and separate Pie chart/Bar Diagrams/3D Pyramid chart have also been prepared.

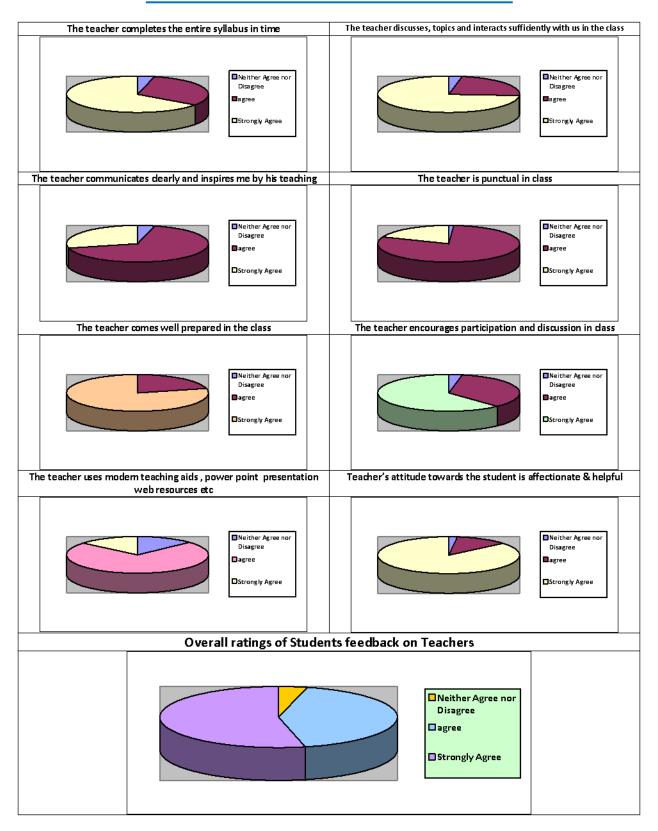

ANALYSIS AT A GLANCE THROUGH 3D PIE CHART



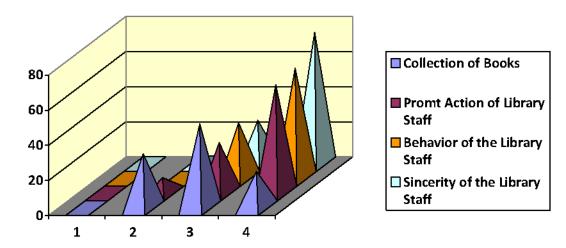

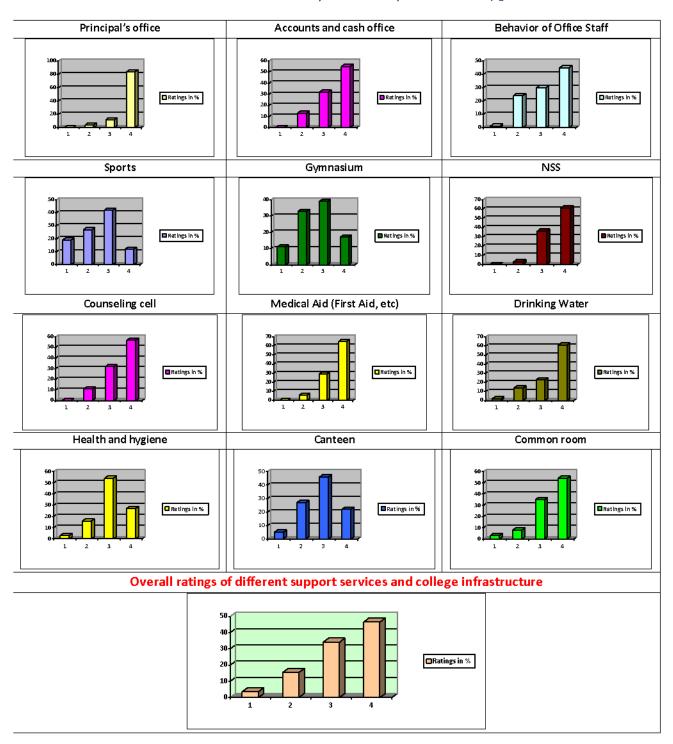

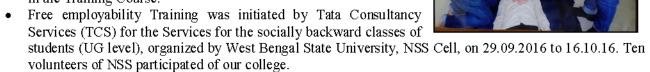

The NSS cell of the college organized a free Health Camp on 23.11.16 in which Doctors provided Necessary medical care and consultation free of cost.

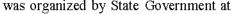

Best Practice

Title: Biometric Attendance System

The objective: The main objective of implementing Biometric Attendance System is as follows:

- i) to ensure digitization of Attendance of all teaching and non teaching staff;
- ii) to keep exact time of arrival and departure of staff;
- iii) to make the attendance system impartial and transparent;
- iv) to get auto generated report at the end of a particular period.

The context:

As the college administration is forwarding towards the digitization in all of its parts to make the office paper-less,

it is a necessary step to introduce Biometric Attendance System.

The Practice:

There are three separate devices for Biometric Attendance for Principal, Teaching Staff and Non teaching staff of the college. At the end of each month the auto generated report from the



machines are collected and duly posted in the Leave Register. The soft copies of all the monthly attendance data are stored in our Google Drive so that we can retrieve the same as and when necessary in future. It is also to mention that the monthly attendance data are sent to the Department of Higher Education (Govt. of West Bengal) along with the claim of salary.

Impact:

- i) It replaces the process of signing the Attendance Register with thumb impression.
- ii) Arrival and departure of staff has turned out to be more regular.
- iii) Uniform time as shown in the system is recorded.
- iv) It is a clear step towards Digitalization.

Title: Implementation of OPAC searching facility in the Central Library and access to eresources through N-List Programme.

The objective: The main objective of implementing OPAC searching facility and use of N-List programme are described below:

- I. To facilitate the students to search the catalogue in a machine readable form from multiple terminals by multiple users at a time.
- II. To make the search quick, easy and to save the time of the users.
- III. To quicken the circulation process and increase the circulation rate as well.
- IV. To render access to the electronic resources through ICT enabled infrastructure beside the use of printed ones.



The context:

From 2016, Koha library automation software was implemented in the Central Library for automating the main house-keeping operations as well as services to users. After making the complete database of bibliographic details of library resources, the library

made initiative to introduce the searching facility through Koha OPAC. In November 2016 the Central Library has taken membership of the N-List Programme of INFLIBNET for e-resource access.

The Practice:

There are Nine terminals at present in the Central Library; the student and staff of our college can access OPAC through these terminals. One terminal is kept only for OPAC searching. Moreover, the OPAC searching facility is available and accessible from any terminals within the college premises through Wi-Fi and LAN connectivity. The students can search the title, author, call no. and subject of the books through Koha. There are facility to see the catalogue in different formats like AACR2, normal and MARC format. The user can see also the location of the item whether it is in departmental library or in central library and determine the holding status or circulation history whether the book is available in the library or issued to anyone. The student and staff are oriented to learn searching through Koha OPAC. Searching of e-books and e-journals and getting its full text access through N-List programme is another initiative taken in this academic year. The students and faculties are oriented how to search e-resources through N-List and they are provided User-Id and password for accessing e-resources remotely from anywhere and anytime.

Impact:

- I. It replaces the process of manual searching of catalogues of books in the library.
- II. Many users of the library now can avail searching facility through Koha at a time from more than one terminal in the library.
- III. The faculties can access e-resources of N-List programme from anywhere using their respective user-Id and password.
- IV. Students can not only access books and other non-book materials of the library but also get the access of e-resources of eminent publishers through N-List programme in the digital section of the Central Library.
